Kedleston-house, the splendid seat of lord Scarsdale, which is in the immediate neighbourhood of this town, is well worthy the attention of every traveller. It is indeed a most superb pile of building, where no expence has been spared to attain the highest degree of external and internal decoration. The Egyptian hall is one of the noblest and most magnificent rooms in Europe, and all its ornaments are adapted with so much judgment, and finished in such exquisite taste, that the whole forms a scene of genuine edificial grandeur. The roof of this splendid room is supported by a great number of Corinthian columns of Derbyshire marble, most beautifully variegated. These are fluted, and, being contrasted with their high-wrought capitals, which are of pure statuary marble, afford the most striking spectacle of solid beauty which we have ever seen in any house or palace in any country. All the apartments are truly noble, the furniture of uncommon cost, and many of the rooms adorned with the most capital paintings of the most eminent masters.
